



Conor Gearty is professor of human rights law at LSE, and an honorary King's Counsel as well as a Fellow of the British Academy and an Honorary Bencher of the King's Inn. He has written numerous books on human rights, terrorism and civil liberties, most recently Homeland Insecurity. The Rise and Rise of Global Anti-terrorism Law. Conor grew up in Ballinacross and attended the Covent School in Granard and Abbeylara national school.

Peter Geoghegan is an Irish writer and journalist whose work has appeared in publications like the New York Times and the Guardian. He served as openDemocracy's UK investigations editor from 2018 to 2021 and was editor-in-chief and CEO from 2021 to 2023. Geoghegan co-founded the Scottish investigative website the Ferret and was nominated for several British Journalism awards. His book Democracy for Sale: Dark Money and Dirty Politics was released in 2020.

John Connell is a journalist, author, playwright, documentary maker, producer and the festival's co-founder

and director. He has earned a reputation for his exceptional work in creating insightful and impactful human rights documentaries that have been screened worldwide, drawing attention to important issues and inspiring meaningful change.



Claire Keegan was shortlisted for the Booker Prize in 2022. She is a novelist and short story writer, whose work has won numerous awards and been translated into 30 languages. Keegan was brought up on a farm in Ireland. At the age of 17, she travelled to New Orleans, where she studied English and Political Science at Loyola University. She returned to Ireland in 1992, and her highly acclaimed first volume of short stories – Antarctica – was published in 1999.

Her stories are translated into 30 languages and have won numerous accolades. Antarctica won the Rooney Prize for Irish Literature. Walk the Blue Fields won the Edge Hill Prize, awarded to the finest collection of stories published in the British Isles. Foster won the Davy Byrnes Award and was last year chosen by The Times as one of the top 50 works of fiction to be published in the 21st century. Small Things Like These was shortlisted for the 2022 Rathbones Folio Prize. It won the Kerry Group Irish Novel of the Year Award and the Orwell Prize for Political Fiction and was shortlisted for the Booker Prize 2022.



Sinéad Gleeson is a critically acclaimed writer and editor who has received numerous accolades for her contributions to the literary world.

Her collection of personal essays, Constellations: Reflections from Life, has been recognized with the prestigious Non-Fiction Book of the Year Award at the Irish Book Awards and the Dalkey Literary Award for Emerging Writer.

In addition to her award-winning work, Sinéad has edited several anthologies and collaborated with artists and musicians on groundbreaking projects.

Shaunagh Connaire is an award-winning journalist and filmmaker and was previously the Director of

Communications and Media at the Clooney Foundation.



Carole Cadwalladr is a renowned Pulitzer-nominated journalist for the Guardian, feature writer for the Observer, and Cambridge Analytica investigator. She was a Pulitzer Prize finalist for National Reporting in 2019, receiving praise upon her investigation and coverage into Cambridge Analytica and its role in Brexit. Cadwalladr's sheer dedication in exposing a nexus of corruption that resulted in Mark Zuckerberg being called before Congress, and exposing Cambridge Analytica's role in mass-harvesting data to influence elections (Brexit and Trump), goes far beyond the question of Remain or Leave. Her investigation also interrogates the role we have been puppeteered to play in a 2017 Britain that took its first step into an undemocratic world.

In April 2019, Cadwalladr gave a TED talk, "Facebook's role in Brexit – and the threats to democracy", regarding her the links found between Facebook and the Brexit election. This talk led to worldwide acclaim but it also sparked a three year long lawsuit which was won by Carole in June 2022.



Bryan Dobson is a renowned Irish journalist, now retired, newscaster and presenter who worked for RTÉ. He presented the RTÉ News at One on RTÉ Radio One, RTÉ News: Six One, RTÉ News: Nine O'Clock,

Before joining RTÉ in 1987, he worked for BBC Northern Ireland. Dobson joined RTÉ News and Current Affairs as a reporter in 1992. Before being the main RTÉ News: Nine O'Clock presenter, he was the RTÉ Business Correspondent.



John Banville was born in Wexford in 1945 and now lives in Dublin. His first book, Long Lankin, was published in 1970 (revised edition, Gallery Books, 1984). He has published fourteen novels: Nightspawn, Birchwood, Doctor Copernicus, Kepler, The Newton Letter, Mefisto, The Book of Evidence, which was shortlisted for the 1989 Booker Prize and which won the 1989 GPA Award, Ghosts, Athena, The Untouchable, Eclipse, Shroud, The Sea (winner of the 2005 Booker Prize) and The Infinities. In 2016 he published Time Pieces: A Dublin Memoir. He also publishes crime novels under the pseudonym Benjamin Black.

Awards include a Lannan Literary Award, the Man Booker Prize (2005), the Franz Kafka Prize in 2011 and the 2013 Irish PEN Award for Outstanding Achievement in Irish Literature. Other awards include the Allied Irish Banks Prize, the Macauley Fellowship, the American-Irish Foundation Literary Award, the James Tait Black Memorial Prize, the Guardian Prize and the Guinness Peat Aviation Award

Belinda McKeon is a novelist, short story writer and playwright. She is the author of the novels Solace (2011) and Tender 2015), and has had short fiction and nonfiction published in The Paris Review, Granta, Winter Papers, A Public Space, The Stinging Fly and elsewhere. Her plays have been produced in Dublin and New York, most recently at the 2017 Dublin Theatre Festival, with Nora (Corn Exchange).

After almost two decades in the US, where she taught at Rutgers University, she is now an Associate Professor in the English Department at Maynooth University, where she directs the MA in Creative Writing


